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Met Éireann

Met Éireann, Ireland's National Meteorological Service is tasked with the provision of a wide range of services related to the weather to help protect life and property and promote societal and economic wellbeing. It provides services to a broad range of sectors including aviation, ground transport, marine and agriculture. It also plays a key role in the State's emergency planning and management function through its production and communication of warnings related to weather hazards.

Met Éireann's vision is to 'Make Ireland Weather and Climate Prepared' by helping Irish society to be ready for and responsive to weather and climate risks. Further details are outlined in Met Éireann's strategic plan 2017-2027 (www.met.ie/about-us/strategy).

Met Éireann has a current staffing level of approximately 200 employees across eight divisions. The majority of staff are based at Met Éireann's headquarters at Glasnevin, Dublin close to the National Botanic Gardens, and a number of staff involved in the provision of services to the aviation sector, are based at airport locations across the country.

Instrumentation Engineer Vacancies

As a scientific organisation, a large section of the Met Éireann workforce comprises technical and professional staff. We are currently recruiting Instrumentation Engineers to work within Met Éireann, at the grade of Senior Meteorological Officer.

➤ Brief description of the role

The role of an Instrumentation Engineer involves supporting meteorological instrumentation; associated data capture systems and communications infrastructure; the provision of engineering support; documenting and maintaining accurate records in compliance with WMO and ISO 9001:2015 quality management standards. The Instrumentation Engineer must be capable of working as part of a team, and collaborating effectively with technical colleagues and other stakeholders.

➤ Principal Duties

The Instrumentation Engineer is responsible for supporting meteorological instrumentation, associated data capture systems and communications infrastructure. Specific duties include, but may not be limited to:

- Providing maintenance and support for instrumentation and infrastructure associated with Met Éireann's observation programmes;
- Managing observation system quality including the design and implementation of calibration systems;
- Managing and developing data acquisition and communications associated with observation systems;
- Planning and managing the installation of new observation equipment and systems including design, specification and pre-operational assessment;
- Testing, modifying and repairing electrical and electronic equipment at component level;
- Working out of doors and/or throughout the country, driving official transport and climbing masts;
- Advising on the planning and development of Met Éireann's Observation systems and developing associated business cases;
- Drafting technical documentation, manuals and reports;
- Providing training to end-users;
- Collaborating effectively with technical experts and other stakeholder on ICT related issues;
- Working in accordance with relevant national and international regulations and standards;
- Other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the Head of Division.

➤ Working location

Instrumentation Engineers may be based at any Met Éireann location, including HQ Glasnevin, Dublin Airport, Shannon Airport and Valentia Observatory, Co. Kerry. The post will be in an office environment with travel and visits to airports sites, weather stations and

climate stations in remote locations. Work outside of normal hours, including evenings and weekends, may on occasion be necessary as workloads dictate and the Instrumentation Engineers must respond to call outs within agreed time limits.

➤ ESSENTIAL for the role

- NFQ Level 7 qualification in one or more of the following:
 - Physics
 - Electronic engineering
 - Telecoms/Network engineering
 - Engineering technology
 - Electronics
 - Instrumentation

or equivalent expertise obtained through relevant work-related achievements. *Note:* For candidates relying on demonstrable, relevant equivalent expertise instead of formal qualification, typically 4 years such experience will be required.

- Minimum 18 months' experience in the testing, commissioning and support of instrumentation or systems;
- Electrical/electronic experience including ability to read technical schematics;
- Good working knowledge of the application of ICT systems (including communications protocols) in an instrumentation environment;
- Experience working in a project management environment;
- Full current EU driving licence.

➤ DESIRABLE for the role

- Good knowledge of meteorological instrumentation as applied to atmospheric observations;
- Experience of aviation sector, operating in a controlled regulated environment (i.e. Airfield);

- Good knowledge and experience of remote sensing observing systems and their applications;
- Good knowledge of calibration systems and associated quality management systems;
- Awareness of instrumentation-related Health & Safety policy including electrical safety;
- Good working knowledge of communication protocols such as TCP/IP, RS232, RS485;
- Good knowledge of programming/coding languages.

Working as a Senior Meteorological Officer

The Instrumentation Engineers we are currently recruiting will work at the grade of Senior Meteorological Officer (SMO). Met Éireann SMOs are technical staff and key members of the organisation's mid-management team. Usually reporting to and supporting their section's Principal Meteorological Officer, they are responsible for maintaining the operational systems and the meteorological infrastructure of Met Éireann.

SMOs work across a range of divisions within Met Éireann and roles and responsibilities are assigned based on the function and priorities of the division to which the officer is appointed. As for all Met Éireann staff, duties assigned to a SMO may be altered from time to time in line with requirements set out by the Director of Met Éireann.

The Senior Meteorological Officer (SMO) grade is roughly equivalent to the general Higher Executive Officer (HEO) Civil Service grade.

SMOs are generally responsible for directing, coordinating and executing operational processes in their Unit and principal duties usually include:

- People and Project Management
 - Managing and supervising the performance of staff;
 - Mentoring and coaching staff and aiding skillset development;
 - Managing projects including initiating, planning and execution. Resource management and project control to ensure that specific goals are achieved within required timeframes and budgets.

- Networking
 - Customer service functions including the development and maintenance of good working relationships;
 - Establishing and developing effective relationships with external agencies with which Met Éireann works nationally and internationally;
 - Building good working relationships and working effectively with internal colleagues, with business units and cross divisionally.

- Operational process support
 - Advising on process planning, development, improvement and implementation;
 - Change control;
 - Procurement of products and services;
 - Managing external contractors and contracts.

Successful candidates should be able to demonstrate the following key Senior Meteorological Officer competencies:

- Analysis/Problem Solving
- Commitment to Quality Results
- Decision Making and Judgement
- Communicating and Influencing
- Flexibility & Change Orientation

Eligibility to compete and certain restrictions on eligibility

Citizenship Requirements

Eligible Candidates must:

- (a) A citizen of the European Economic Area. The EEA consists of the Member States of the European Union, Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway; or
- (b) A citizen of the United Kingdom (UK); or
- (c) A citizen of Switzerland pursuant to the agreement between the EU and Switzerland on the free movement of persons; or
- (d) A non-EEA citizen who is a spouse or child of an EEA or Swiss citizen and has a stamp 4 visa; or
- (e) A person awarded international protection under the International Protection Act 2015 or any family member entitled to remain in the State as a result of family reunification and has a stamp 4 visa or
- (f) A non-EEA citizen who is a parent of a dependent child who is a citizen of, and resident in, an EEA member state or Switzerland and has a stamp 4 visa

To qualify candidates must meet one of the citizenship criteria above by the date of any job offer.

Collective Agreement: Redundancy Payments to Public Servants

The Department of Public Expenditure and Reform letter dated 28th June 2012 to Personnel Officers introduced, with effect from 1st June 2012, a Collective Agreement which had been reached between the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform and the Public Services Committee of the ICTU in relation to ex-gratia Redundancy Payments to Public Servants. It is a condition of the Collective Agreement that persons availing of the agreement will not be eligible for re-employment in the Public Service by any Public Service body (as defined by the Financial Emergency Measures in the Public Interest Acts 2009 – 2011) for a period of 2 years from termination of the employment. People who availed of this scheme and who may be successful in this competition will have to prove their eligibility (expiry of period of non-eligibility)

Incentivised Scheme for Early Retirement (ISER)

It is a condition of the Incentivised Scheme for Early Retirement (ISER) as set out in Department of Finance Circular 12/09 that retirees, under that Scheme, are not eligible to apply for another position in the same employment or the same sector. Therefore, such retirees may not apply for this position.

Department of Health and Children Circular (7/2010)

The Department of Health Circular 7/2010 dated 1 November 2010 introduced a Targeted Voluntary Early Retirement (VER) Scheme and Voluntary Redundancy Schemes (VRS). It is a condition of the VER scheme that persons availing of the scheme will not be eligible for re-employment in the public health sector or in the wider Public Service or in a body wholly or mainly funded from public moneys. The same prohibition on re-employment applies under the VRS, except that the prohibition is for a period of 7 years. People who availed of the VER scheme are not eligible to compete in this competition. People who availed of the VRS scheme and who may be successful in this competition will have to prove their eligibility (expiry of period of non-eligibility).

Department of Environment, Community & Local Government (Circular Letter LG(P) 06/2013)

The Department of Environment, Community & Local Government Circular Letter LG(P) 06/2013 introduced a Voluntary Redundancy Scheme for Local Authorities. In accordance with the terms of the *Collective Agreement: Redundancy Payments to Public Servants* dated 28 June 2012 as detailed above, it is a specific condition of that VER Scheme that persons will not be eligible for re-employment in any Public Service body [as defined by the Financial Emergency Measures in the Public Interest Acts 2009 – 2011 and the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012] for a period of 2 years from their date of departure under this Scheme. These conditions also apply in the case of engagement/employment on a contract for service basis (either as a contractor or as an employee of a contractor).

Declaration

Applicants will be required to declare whether they have previously availed of a Public Service scheme of incentivised early retirement. Applicants will also be required to declare any entitlements to a Public Service pension benefit (in payment or preserved) from any other Public Service employment and/or where they have received a payment-in-lieu in respect of service in any Public Service employment.

Principal Conditions of Service

General

The appointment is subject to the Civil Service Regulations Acts 1956 to 2005 and the Public Service Management (Recruitment and Appointments) Act 2004 and any other Act for the time being in force relating to the Civil Service.

Pay

The salary for the position of Senior Meteorological Officer (with effect from 1 October 2022) is as follows:

The Personal Pension Contribution (PPC) salary rate for the position of Senior Meteorological Officer:

The PPC pay rate applies when the individual is required to pay a Personal Pension Contribution (otherwise known as a main scheme contribution) in accordance with the rules of their main/personal superannuation scheme. This is different to a contribution in respect of membership of a Spouses' and Children's scheme, or the Additional Superannuation Contributions (ASC).

A different rate will apply where the appointee is an existing civil or public servant appointed on or before 6 April 1995 and is not required to make a personal pension contribution.

Long Service Increments may be payable after 3 years (LSI1) and 6 years (LSI2) satisfactory service at the maximum of the scale.

Important Note

Entry will be at the minimum of the scale and the rate of remuneration will not be subject to negotiation and may be adjusted from time to time in line with Government pay policy.

Different terms and conditions may apply if you are a currently serving civil or public servant.

Subject to satisfactory performance increments may be payable in line with current Government Policy.

Different terms and conditions may apply if, immediately prior to appointment, the appointee is a serving civil or public servant.

Payment will be made fortnightly in arrears by Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) into a bank account of an officer's choice. Payment cannot be made until a BIC code and IBAN number and bank sort code has been supplied to the Personnel Section of the relevant Department or Office. Statutory deductions from salary will be made as appropriate by the Department/Office.

You will agree that any overpayment of salary, allowances, or expenses will be repaid by you in accordance with Circular 07/2018: Recovery of Salary, Allowances, and Expenses Overpayments made to Staff Members/Former Staff Members/Pensioners.

Tenure and Probation

The appointment is to a permanent position on a probationary contract in the Civil Service.

The probationary contract will be for a period of one year from the date of appointment. .

During the period of the probationary contract, an officer's performance will be subject to review by the appropriate supervisor(s) to determine whether the officer:

- (i) has performed in a satisfactory manner
- (ii) has been satisfactory in general conduct, and
- (iii) is suitable from the viewpoint of health with particular regard to sick leave.

Prior to completion of the probationary contract a decision will be made as to whether or not the officer will be retained pursuant to *Section 5A(2) Civil Service Regulation Acts 1956-2005*. This decision will be based on the officer's performance assessed against the criteria set out in (i) to (iii) above. The detail of the probationary process will be explained to the officer by the Department/Office. A copy of Department of Finance guidelines on probation will also be made available to the officer.

Where an officer is an existing civil servant and is not considered as suitable to the position having been assessed against stated criteria, the officer will be notified in writing of the action to be taken prior to the expiry of the probationary contract and any extensions thereof.

Notwithstanding the preceding paragraphs in this section, the probationary contract may be terminated at any time prior to the expiry of the term of the contract by either side in accordance with the Minimum Notice and Terms of Employment Acts, 1973 to 2005.

In certain circumstances the contract may be extended and the probation period suspended. The extension must be agreed by both parties.

- The probationary period stands suspended where an employee is absent due to Maternity or Adoptive Leave
- In relation to an employee absent on Parental Leave or Carers Leave, the employer may require probation to be suspended if the absence is not considered to be consistent with a continuation of the probation
- Probation may be suspended in cases such as absence due to a non-recurring illness.

The employee may in these circumstances make application to the employer for an extension to the contract period.

All appointees will serve a one-year probationary period. If an appointee who fails to satisfy the conditions of probation has been a serving civil servant immediately prior to their appointment from this competition, the issue of reversion will normally arise. In the event of reversion, an officer will return to a vacancy in their former grade in their former Department.

Headquarters

Any Met Éireann location. Location will be dependent on post vacancy at the time of drawdown.

Note: At a given time, the appointed officer may be instructed to work remotely, in line with government guidelines.

The officer's headquarters will be such as may be designated from time to time by the Director. When absent from home and headquarters on duty appropriate travelling expenses and subsistence allowances will be paid, subject to the normal civil service regulations and the guidelines of Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage.

Unfair Dismissals Act 1977 – 2005

The Unfair Dismissals Acts 1977-2005 will not apply to the termination of this employment by reason only of the expiry of this probationary contract without it being renewed.

Annual Leave

The annual leave allowance for successful candidates will be 29 working days per annum rising to 30 days after 5 years' service. This allowance, which is subject to the usual conditions regarding the granting of annual leave, is on the basis of a five-day week and is exclusive of the usual public holidays.

Duties

The officer will be required to perform any duties appropriate to the position which may be assigned from time to time. The position is full time and the officer may not engage in private practice or be connected with any outside business which would interfere with the performance of official duties.

Hours of Attendance

Hours of attendance are as fixed from time to time. The current requirement is 41 hours and 15 minutes gross or 35 hours net per week. Officers may be required to perform rostered duties on rotation over 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Shift pay at the rate of 27% of basic salary is payable to officers on 24 hour rostered duties. Special arrangements also apply for attendance on public holidays and for extra attendances.

Organisation of Working Time Act 1997

The terms of the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997 will, where appropriate, apply to this appointment.

Sick Leave

Pay during properly certified sick absence, provided there is no evidence of permanent disability for service, will apply on a pro-rata basis, in accordance with the provisions of the sick leave circulars as amended from time to time.

Officers, who will be paying the Class A rate of PRSI, will be required to sign a mandate authorising the Department of Social Protection to pay any benefits due under the Social Welfare Acts direct to the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. Payment of salary during illness will be subject to the officer making the necessary claims for social insurance benefit to the Department of Social Protection within the required time limits.

Superannuation and Retirement

The successful candidate will be offered the appropriate superannuation terms and conditions as prevailing in the Civil Service at the time of being offered an appointment. In general, an appointee who has never worked in the Public Service will be offered appointment based on membership of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme"). Full details of the Scheme are at www.singlepensionscheme.gov.ie.

Where the appointee has worked in a pensionable (non-Single Scheme terms) public service job in the 26 weeks prior to appointment or is currently on a career break or special leave with/without pay different terms may apply. The pension entitlement of such appointees will be established in the context of their public service employment history.

Key provisions attaching to membership of the Single Scheme are as follows:

- Pensionable Age: The minimum age at which pension is payable is the same as the age of eligibility for the State Pension, currently 66.
- Retirement Age: Scheme members must retire on reaching the age of 70.
- Career average earnings are used to calculate benefits (a pension and lump sum amount accrue each year and are up-rated each year by reference to CPI).
- Post retirement pension increases are linked to CPI.

Pension Abatement

- If the appointee has previously been employed in the Civil or Public Service and is in receipt of a pension from the Civil or Public Service or where a Civil/Public Service pension comes into payment during his/her re-employment that pension **will be subject to abatement** in accordance with Section 52 of the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012. **Please Note: In applying for this position you are acknowledging that you understand that the abatement provisions, where relevant, will apply. It is not envisaged that the employing Department/Office will support an application for an abatement waiver in respect of appointments to this position.**
- However, if the appointee was previously employed in the Civil or Public Service and awarded a pension under voluntary early retirement arrangements (other than the Incentivised Scheme of Early Retirement (ISER), the Department of Health Circular 7/2010 VER/VRS or the Department of Environment, Community & Local Government Circular letter LG(P) 06/2013, any of which renders a person ineligible for the competition) the entitlement to that pension will cease with effect from the date of reappointment. Special arrangements may, however be made for the reckoning of previous service given by the appointee for the purpose of any future superannuation award for which the appointee may be eligible.
- **Department of Education and Skills Early Retirement Scheme for Teachers Circular 102/2007**
The Department of Education and Skills introduced an Early Retirement Scheme for Teachers. It is a condition of the Early Retirement Scheme that with the exception of the situations set out in paragraphs 10.2 and 10.3 of the relevant circular documentation, and with those exceptions only, if a teacher accepts early retirement under Strands 1, 2 or 3 of this scheme and is subsequently employed in any capacity in any area of the public sector, payment of pension to that person under the scheme will immediately cease. Pension payments will, however, be resumed on the ceasing of such employment or on the person's 60th birthday, whichever is the later, but on resumption, the pension will be based on the person's actual

reckonable service as a teacher (i.e. the added years previously granted will not be taken into account in the calculation of the pension payment).

- **Ill-Health-Retirement**

Please note any person who previously retired on ill health grounds under the terms of a superannuation scheme are required to declare, at the initial application phase, that they are in receipt of such a pension to the organisation administering the recruitment competition.

Applicants will be required to attend the CMO's office to assess their ability to provide regular and effective service taking account of the condition which qualified them for IHR.

Appointment post ill-health retirement from Civil Service

If successful in their application through the competition, the applicant should be aware of the following:

1. If deemed fit to provide regular and effective service and assigned to a post, their civil service ill-health pension ceases.
2. If the applicant subsequently fails to complete probation or decides to leave their assigned post, there can be no reversion to the civil service IHR status, nor reinstatement of the civil service IHR pension, that existed prior to the application nor is there an entitlement to same.
3. The applicant will become a member of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme (SPSPS) upon appointment if they have had a break in pensionable public/civil service of more than 26 weeks.

Appointment post ill-health retirement from Public Service

1. Where an individual has retired from a public service body his/her ill-health pension from that employment may be subject to review in accordance with the rules of ill-health retirement under that scheme.
2. If an applicant is successful, on appointment the applicant will be required to declare whether they are in receipt of a public service pension (ill-health or otherwise) and their public service pension may be subject to abatement.
3. The applicant will become a member of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme (SPSPS) upon appointment if they have had a break in pensionable public/civil service of more than 26 weeks.

Pension Accrual

A 40-year limit on total service that can be counted towards pension where a person has been a member of more than one pre-existing public service pension scheme (i.e. non-Single Scheme) as per the 2012 Act shall apply. This 40-year limit is provided for in the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012. This may have implications for any appointee who has acquired pension rights in a previous public service employment.

Additional Superannuation Contribution

This appointment is subject to the Additional Superannuation Contribution (ASC) in accordance with the Public Service Pay and Pensions Act 2017. **Note:** ASC deductions are in addition to any pension

contributions (main scheme and spouses' and children's contributions) required under the rules of your pension scheme.

Official Secrecy and Integrity

You will, during the term of your appointment, be subject to the provisions of the Official Secrets Act 1963, as amended by the Freedom of Information Act 2014. You will agree not to disclose to unauthorised third parties any confidential information especially that with commercial potential either during or subsequent to the period of employment. You will also be subject to the Civil Service Code of Standards and Behaviour.

Civil Service Code of Standards and Behaviour

You will be subject to the Civil Service Code of Standards and Behaviour.

Ethics in Public Office Act 1995

The Ethics in Public Office Act 1995 will apply, where appropriate, to your employment.

Prior Approval of Publications

You will agree not to publish material related to your official duties without prior approval by the Secretary General of the Department.

Political Activity

During the term of your employment you will be subject to the rules governing Civil Servants and politics.

As an Employer of Choice the Civil Service has many flexible and family friendly working policies including some opportunities for remote working. Please note, successful candidates may request flexible working opportunities, however, this is at the discretion of the employer and decided in line with the business needs of the organisation, and on a case by case basis.

RECRUITMENT PROCESS

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage is recruiting for this position under its Recruitment Licence issued by the Commission for Public Service Appointments (CPSA) and in accordance with the CPSA's Code of Practice.

The Application Form allows applicants to detail their qualifications, skills and experience and provide a personal statement outlining why they should be considered for the post and how they meet the essential requirements and personal attributes of the post.

Essential Requirements and Personal Attributes

Candidates will be required to possess all the essential requirements and personal attributes required for the position. They will be requested to demonstrate this both in the application form and, if shortlisted, by interview.

Health

Candidates must be in a state of health such as would indicate a reasonable prospect of ability to render regular and efficient service.

Selection Process

The selection process may include the shortlisting of candidates on the basis of the application form and will include an interview.

Shortlisting

A shortlisting process will involve an expert panel that will select candidates for interview who, based on an examination of the application form and assessed against the essential requirements and personal attributes required, appear to be the most suitable for the position.

Confidentiality

Subject to the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act, 2014 applications will be treated in strict confidence.

Security Clearance

Police vetting may be sought in respect of individuals who come under consideration for appointment. The applicant will be required to complete and return a Garda Vetting form should they come under consideration for appointment. This form will be forwarded to An Garda Síochána for security checks on all Irish and Northern Irish addresses at which they resided. The applicant will also be required to provide clearance/disclosure from the police force or equivalent authority of any country in which the applicant under consideration for appointment has resided for more than 6 months. If unsuccessful this information will be destroyed. If the applicant subsequently comes under consideration for another position, they will be required to supply this information again.

A panel may be formed from which future vacancies may be filled from this campaign.

Once a candidate has accepted an offer of appointment their name will be removed from the panel and no further offers of appointment will be made.

Interview

Candidates who are shortlisted will be called for interview by an expert panel. The interview will focus how the candidate meets the essential requirements and personal attributes of the post and their career and experience to date.

Note: Candidates will be notified of interview dates and arrangements at the earliest opportunity. The onus will be on candidates to make themselves available for interview as advised.

Deeming of candidature to be withdrawn

Candidates who do not attend for interview as required or who do not, when requested, furnish such evidence, as the Department requires in regard to any matter relevant to their candidature, will have no further claim to consideration.

It is important to remember that this is a competitive process for a role where integrity is paramount. Sharing information on the selection process e.g. through social media or any other means, may result in you being disqualified from the competition.

Contravention Code of Practice

Any person who contravenes the above provisions or who assists another person in contravening the above provisions is guilty of an offence. A person who is found guilty of an offence is liable to a fine/or imprisonment.

In addition, if a person found guilty of an offence was, or is a candidate at a recruitment process,

- they will be disqualified as a candidate and excluded from the process;
- has been appointed to a post following the recruitment process, they will be removed from that post.

Use of Recording Equipment

The use of any type of recording equipment on its premises is prohibited. This applies to any form of sound recording and any type of still picture or video recording, whether including sound recording or not, and covers any type of device used for these purposes.

Any person wishing to use such equipment for any of these purposes must seek written permission in advance. This policy is in place to protect the privacy of staff and customers and the integrity of our assessment material and assessment processes.

Unsanctioned use of recording equipment by any person is a breach of this policy. Any candidate involved in such a breach could be disqualified from the competition and could be subject to prosecution under section 55 of the Public Service Management (Recruitment & Appointments) Act, 2004. In addition, where a person found guilty of an offence was or is a candidate at a recruitment process, then:

- Where he/she has not been appointed to a post, he/she will be disqualified as a candidate; and
- Where he/she has been appointed subsequently to the recruitment process in question, he/she shall forfeit that appointment.

Specific candidate criteria

Candidates must:

- Have the knowledge and ability to discharge the duties of the post concerned;
- Be suitable on the grounds of character;
- Be suitable in all other relevant respects for appointment to the post concerned;
- and if successful, they will not be appointed to the post unless they:

Agree to undertake the duties attached to the post and accept the conditions under which the duties are, or may be required to be, performed.

Are fully competent and available to undertake, and fully capable of undertaking, the duties attached to the position.

General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)

The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) came into force on the 25th May 2018, replacing the existing data protection framework under the EU Data Protection Directive.

When you submit an application for a competition, we create a computer record in your name. Information submitted with a job application is used in processing your application. Where the services of a third party are used in processing your application, it may be required to provide them with information, however all necessary precautions will be taken to ensure the security of your data. If you are successful in the recruitment and selection competition, your application may be made available to the Human Resources section of the organisation to which you have been assigned.
